Sexual Assault in the Military, Department of Defense Findings~ Anita M. Carpenter, CEO INCASA- Secretary of Defense Donald Rumsfeld appointed Ms. Carpenter to serve on a congressionally appointed Task Force to investigate sexual assault at the Air Force Academy in 2003. Following that she was appointed to the Department of Defense Task Force to Investigate Sexual Harassment and Violence at the Military Academies. In 2008 she was appointed to the follow-along task force, the Defense Task Force on Sexual Assault in the Military Services, which examined all of the branches of service world-wide and focused on military personnel in combat.

Primary Prevention – Brett Sokolow, JD.

- ☛ Primary prevention. Harm reduction. Scare tactics. Tertiary prevention. Victim blaming. Predators. Normative messaging. Abstinence. Secondary prevention. Consent education. Empathy induction. Alcohol education. Myths. Facts. Legal education. Bystander intervention. Environmental management. Our field does not lack for modalities by which we can educate students and community members about sexual violence. But, what actually works? Prevention is still a young field, and finding the right strategy for your organization is the goal of this presentation. We'll explore how prevention actually works, how we measure change, what the research tells us, and the many things the research does not. Innovative and promising approaches are being applied across the country. What can we learn from them, and how do we apply those lessons to the population we are trying to affect? How often should we educate. How? At what times of the year? To whom? How do we follow-up? This session will explore these topics and offer concrete, practical suggests for developing and refining your strategy to maximize its efficacy.

Listen to Me Prevention Curriculum- Prevention Advisory Council

Trainer: Katie O'Bryan, BA, MPA, Director of Prevention Education and Outreach INCASA

Description: *Listen to Me* presents child sexual abuse prevention that focuses on personal safety and awareness. This session will teach the basic concept of *Listen to Me*- internal alarms and instincts that we are all born with but often lose touch with as we become adults. In this session you will understand the history of the council and how the curriculum was developed.

Sexual Violence and HIV- Midwest AIDS Training and Education Center-
