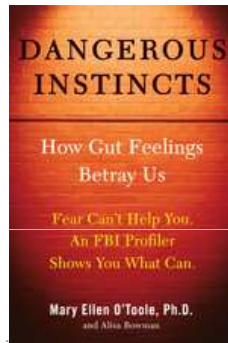

Day Two Morning Session

"Forensic Science, Challenges for the 21st Century" In criminal cases the admittance of forensic evidence, which includes DNA, fingerprints, handwriting, hair, bite marks, bloodstains, and bullets, can often shape the outcome of the trial. A panel of experts will discuss the minimum qualifications needed for expert witnesses to describe and evaluate forensic evidence. Panelists will also explore how technology can assist the court in managing, enhancing and searching for evidentiary materials when determining the admissibility of forensic evidence.



Keynote Session

Lauren Book, founder of Lauren's Kids, was a victim of childhood sexual abuse for six years at the hands of her nanny. Armed with the knowledge that 95 percent of sexual abuse is preventable through education, Lauren sought to turn her experience into a vehicle to prevent childhood sexual abuse and heal survivors.

Prevention Breakouts

Social Media Policies in Prevention – Erik Scheub, Director of Media and Public Relations from INCASA. Objective: Participants will increase knowledge of policies and protocols for online social networking regarding issues such as online hate crimes, cyber bullying, and cyber stalking.

Engaging the Multigeneration Workforce – Dr. Carol Hagan, HSPP, LLC Objectives: Participants in this fast-paced and holistic overview of the Multigenerational Work Force will leave the interaction with: Knowledge of the different generational cohorts and the associated age ranges of each generation currently in the work force. Awareness of the basic historical, sociological, environmental, political and economic factors that shaped the development of each generational cohort. Core concepts that are unifying characteristics endemic to each generation that influences how they work and perceive the world. Heightened understanding and awareness of the possible clash points and ways to work collaboratively with persons in different generations. Information on resources that will help participants continue researching and/or understanding more about the range of generations at work or just their own generation.

Mobilizing Communities – Ron Book, Father and Activist, Objective: Participants will gain insight from a parent that has worked to find resources and support services for his child following a disclosure and learn about the efforts to raise funds for non-profits serving victims of sexual violence.

Advocacy Breakouts

Community Collaboration with Colleges – Brandi Watson, Albion Fellows Bacon Center Community Outreach Director. Objective: To increase awareness on collaborations between service providers and colleges regarding sexual assault awareness and intervention.

From a Survivor – Lavinia Freeman Objective: Participants will learn about the journey from victim to survivor and ways that survivors can engage to raise awareness in their communities.

Victim Centered Approach to Probation – Melanie Pitstick, Supervisor for the Marion Superior Court Probation Department. Objective: Participants will gain an understanding of the victim centered approach to probation and working with the containment team. Additionally the basics of probation will be discussed with an emphasis on ensuring compliance and community safety, registration laws/compliance and implications on this type of intensive supervision.

Medical Breakouts

- **Advanced Adult SANE** – Dr. Patricia Speck, DNSc, APN, FNP-BC, DF-IAFN, FAAFS, FAAN **Adult SA Topic** areas will include the 1) NIJ Study which covers the impact SANE practice has on the SA patient, 2) presentation of case histories to demonstrate and validate forensic nursing practice, 3) research on how estrogen directly effects vaginal changes throughout the menstrual cycle and how this effects the recovery of (perpetrator) DNA, 4) advanced techniques on DNA recovery with protein markers *Objective:* Discuss the SANE practice impact on victim outcomes through case histories, Analyze the clinical characteristics of the effect of estrogen on uro/ano/genital and hymen tissues throughout the lifespan and recognize the extent that disease or conditions may have on the interpretation of injury following sexual assault, Explain the impact of physical and environmental states on the recovery of DNA
- **Advanced SANE Pediatrics** – Dr. Patricia Speck, DNSc, APN, FNP-BC, DF-IAFN, FAAFS, FAAN **Pediatric SA topic** will include the long term effects violence has on children as they mature into adulthood (the physiology of trauma) and how good SANE pediatric practice can potentially interrupt the cycle of violence and help to minimize the long term trauma a child may experience. *Objective:* Review normal growth and development in children, Identify the documented changes to the brain when exposed to family violence and chaos, Recognize the signs and symptoms of untreated childhood sexual trauma in the adult victim of sexual crimes, Discuss the intervention and prevention programs available to families living in chaotic and toxic environments
- **Combined Session with Criminal Justice, Psychopathy** – Mary Ellen O’Toole PhD, Senior FBI Profiler (ret), Forensic Behavioral Consultant. *Objective:* Participants will explore “psychopathy” with the FBI’s leading expert. Participants will be able to apply concepts of this personality disorder to both violent and white collar offenders and their behavior and crime scenes.

Criminal Justice Breakouts

- **Dangerous Instincts** – Mary Ellen O’Toole PhD, Senior FBI Profiler (ret), Forensic Behavioral Consultant. *Objective:* Participants will learn how to understand human behavior and use that information to make better decisions, evaluate people more accurately, assess for threatening situations, minimize threats in the workplace and everyday life, and conduct better “interviews.”
- **Investigating Sexual Assault on the College Campus** – Angie Nally, Director Public Safety, DePauw University and lead trainer on sex crimes investigations at the Indiana Law Enforcement Academy. *Objective:* In the aftermath of Sandusky and Penn State colleges across the nation are looking at their procedures and practices for handling allegations of sexual abuse and rape. Specific to sexual assault that occurs on campus, participants will gain increased knowledge and resources for investigating reports of rape, updates on Title IX and Campus SaVE Act.
- **Combined Session with Medical, Psychopathy** – Mary Ellen O’Toole PhD, Senior FBI Profiler (ret), Forensic Behavioral Consultant. *Objective:* Participants will explore “psychopathy” with the FBI’s leading expert. Participants will be able to apply concepts of this personality disorder to both violent and white collar offenders and their behavior and crime scenes.

Indiana State Police Lab Bryan Good Forensic Biologist and Mary Reed Supervisor, IUPUI Forensic Science Department Instructor Scott Newman, Kristina Korobov, Marion County Prosecutor’s Office. *Objective:* Participants will learn about criminal cases and the admittance of forensic evidence, which includes DNA, fingerprints, handwriting, hair, bite marks, bloodstains, and bullets, can often shape the outcome of the trial. A panel of experts will discuss the minimum qualifications needed for expert witnesses to describe and evaluate forensic evidence. Panelists will also explore how technology can assist the court in managing, enhancing and searching for evidentiary materials when determining the admissibility of forensic evidence.

Afternoon Session – Panel Discussion The Party’s Over – Now What? Beyond the Super Bowl. Indiana Office of the Attorney General Abby Kuzma, Exodus Refugee Carleen Miller, INCASA Kay Jones, Debi Alexander. *Objective:* Participants will increase knowledge on anti-human trafficking work carried out during Super Bowl XLVI in Indianapolis. Discuss collaborations with local, state, and national groups. Learn about training and awareness elements, what worked and what could have been done better. Participants will learn about efforts to carry on activities with other events and receive a toolkit for implementing this type of work in their own communities applicable for any issue.
